In January we moved to our new office at 41 King Street, New Plymouth, alongside Tupu-ā-nuku, one of our iwi workforce development partners. That move has proved very positive!

To achieve our aims we work with our connections in education and health, with iwi, employers, funders and other supporters in Taranaki and beyond. We so value the relationships we have with everyone who supports of our kaupapa! This year amongst all of our activities we have supported 377 from 13 schools around the Maunga and 94 tertiary students, in health and education career pathways and 41 in other pathways.

Hoki Mai Ki Why Ora: Sean Taylor

When Sean left school in 2021, he wasn't sure what he wanted to do - but he knew he wanted to do something! Sean liked working outside and in the garden, and looked up to his uncle who works for Iwi, on the maunga and in the environment.

Sean first registered with our Hoki Mai Ki Why Ora programme at the beginning of 2022. Hoki Mai Ki Why Ora assists taiohi onto meaningful career paths.

Sean wasn't sure if he wanted to study or mahi. He had a CV but needed help with his interviewing skills and confidence. He was interested in horticulture, arboriculture, conservation or forestry but needed to experience them to help him make a decision.

Our Kaiārahi shared options for study and helped Sean develop short-term, mid-term and goals including a work readiness plan. With the support of our partners Tupu ā nuku he attended their Taster days which enable rangatahi to work alongside experienced workers and give them an opportunity to see what environment jobs are really like.

Sean was keen to enter employment and the next step was to get him work-ready. He then began his mahi journey with Matike Ltd doing some planting and spraying for six months.

Sean was then employed by Glasgow Scaffolding part-time to start him off in the workforce at a comfortable pace. Coming into the New Year he is working towards full-time employment. Also he is currently working with Tupu ā nuku to get his driver's license.

Sean has worked so hard and reached the goals he had set for himself at the beginning of this year. We are so proud of what he has achieved and we look forward to what's next!

Role: Why Ora Kaiārahi

Our youngest Kaiārahi Liahna Smith found her passion for life at a young age - and meeting Liahna for the first time you get a strong sense of that!

Starting life in Eltham, at the age of two Liahna moved to Inglewood with her whānau, to be closer to her Nana. From then on, Inglewood became her home and community. While attending Inglewood Primary School, Liahna found her passion for culture, helping others, and her voice. "I started doing kapa haka and I loved it! I became a leader. This made my whānau proud and made me feel good!"

During those years at Inglewood Primary Liahna also discovered her love for sports, competition, and teamwork. Liahna played tennis and won a tennis trophy. "I saw my Mum and my sister's names on it and discovered I had kept up a family tradition without Kaiārahi position. "I was so excited when I got the job realising it!". Liahna then moved onto basketball, netball, touch, rippa rugby, and indoor netball. "I found I really liked team sports - being part of a roopu and feeling supported."

Liahna then attended New Plymouth Girls High School. "My sister went there and it gave me access to It's such a rewarding role providing manaaki to the opportunities for sports and other commitments. It felt so huge after Primary!". She carried on her sports and studies in Maths, English and Social Sciences. She had wanted to do Te Reo Māori but ended up taking other subjects. Like so many taiohi Liahna felt pressured about what to do with her future. "I started out very into learning, but as I got older, I wanted to have a bit more fun! I had expectations of myself - I wanted to strive for the best grade but I was happy if I passed!"



Liahna finished school unsure of what she wanted to do."I was interested in studying teaching but was one UE credit short. My teacher invited me to go back to school during the holidays- but by that stage I just wanted to leave. Also, my niece was just about to be born, so I wanted to stay in Taranaki."

Deciding she wasn't ready for university yet and realising it's not for everyone, Liahna went on to work part-time doing childcare and retail work. "That was when Why Ora asked me if I'd like to come in for a korero and meet the team. After that I was offered a cadetship – it was an awesome opportunity to work full-time for six months to see what mahi they do. I couldn't believe my luck!"

Liahna was then offered an interview for a full-time - my first ever full-time job-offer!"

Now a Kaiārahi for New Plymouth Girls High School, Sacred Heart Girls' College, and Inglewood High School – Liahna loves her mahi!

people we work with. It's so fulfilling to see our relationships grow. We offer extra support outside of whānau and school - sometimes taiohi feel there are a lot of expectations on them and don't always want to talk to the people they see every day."

"What really motivates me is that only two years ago I was one of those taiohi - stuck not knowing what to do. I now look forward to coming to mahi every day to help others. My kapa haka teacher from Inglewood is

now one of the co-ordinators I work with as Kaiārahi for Inglewood High School! So, I've come full-circle!"

Liahna feels she has grown a lot. "I've made friends for life here - everyone has the same vision and is so kind and caring. This job has blown my whānau away too - the way my confidence has grown. It has helped me with speaking Te Reo Māori and to find out more about my whakapapa - my tupuna and hapū. I've picked up the language quickly. This year I even did a Captain's speech to one of my sports teams fully in Te Reo Maori!"

Liahna has plans moving forward – including becoming a qualified primary school teacher and seeing the world.

"I have a five-year plan – I want to have started my teaching degree and be further along on my Te Reo Māori journey. And I want to have travelled too!"

What attracts me to teaching is that I love working with tamariki – I had awesome teachers at school and I want to be like them. I want to share Te Reo Māori with kids coming through.

All the learning I am doing now and will in the future will be to help others. I know my Nana, Grandad and Kui will be smiling down on me and proud of the wahine I am becoming. One that hopefully inspires and motivate others to find and follow their passions and dreams!"
